AWP is Back! High Attendance, New HBCU Fellowship, and Min Jin Lee at #AWP23 in Seattle.

Norfolk, VA — The Association of Writers & Writing Programs returned to Seattle, Washington for its annual AWP Conference & Bookfair (#AWP23). For the first time since the start of the pandemic, AWP welcomed its highest number of attendees. The total checked-in registered attendees in Seattle totaled 9,037, including Saturday-only passes, which comprised 775 attendees. Additionally, 545 attendees joined AWP through the virtual conference platform. AWP also hosted 563 exhibitors, with 632 organizations represented. 350+ events were held on-site at the Seattle Convention Center, and over 250+ off-site events were held throughout Seattle.

Over 1,734 students registered and attended the conference, a majority of which paid less than \$65 for the entire conference. Over 400 attendees participated in the AWP Work-Exchange Program, which grants free registration to the conference in exchange for four hours of conference support on-site. Sixty full scholarships were provided to the in-person conference. AWP is grateful to its community for sustaining the funding for the scholarship program.



AWP welcomed Min Jin Lee, acclaimed author of *Pachinko* and *Free Food for Millionaires*, for an incredible conversation with wellknown librarian Nancy Pearl, as the keynote address on Thursday, March 9, 2023 at 8:00 p.m. PT. "I want people in my community to be cultural citizens; I'm really tired of Asians and Asian Americans being invisible," Lee stated.

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Notable moments at AWP this year include:

The AWP HBCU Fellowship Program

The membership and conference departments collaborated to launch the AWP HBCU Fellowship Program during #AWP23. This new initiative provides stipends, travel, lodging, and conference registration for HBCU faculty and students. The program kicked off with a private luncheon and discussion with author and HBCU professor A.J. Verdelle and the selected student and faculty fellows. The discussion centered on supporting creative writing and paths to publication at their respective schools. Verdelle then held the public lecture "Standing at the Center and Writing from the Margins" on Friday, March 10, followed later in the evening by a launch party to celebrate the new program. James Alan McPherson Endowment

The AWP Prize for the Novel was renamed the James Alan McPherson Prize for the Novel during the AWP Award Series and Celebration. McPherson's daughter, Rachel, spoke before the 2021 AWP Award Series winners read. A silent auction to support the new endowment, consisting of McPherson's former possessions, was also held, with plans for another online auction being held soon. Celebrated author Percival Everett will judge the first James Alan McPherson Prize for the Novel, with the winner to be announced later this year.

Additional Highlights:

The #AWP23 Writer to Agent Program saw 887 applicants – its highest number of applications since the program launched in 2017. All #AWP23 attendees have the opportunity to submit a sample of their work for review by Aevitas Creative Management, Ayesha Pande Literary, Folio Literary Management, Serendipity Literary Agency, and Trellis Literary Management. The agencies held 142 meetings over the conference week, both virtually and in person.

AWP continued its #WritersServe Program this year by supporting donations to Seattlebased nonprofit organization Pongo Poetry Project. #AWP23 attendees donated over seventy journals and notes in support of Pongo's mission to "engage youth in writing poetry to inspire healing and growth."
