# **EVENT TITLE: Truth Sayers: Poetry Collectives as a 21st Century Political Act**

**EVENT DESCRIPTION:** June Jordan said, "To tell the truth is to become beautiful, to begin to love yourself, value yourself. And that's political, in its most profound way." Moderated by Gonzalez, the collective then goes into a discussion exploring the following questions (in this sequence):

• Why was the Write on Poetry Babes Collective created? What was the need? About 7 minutes of discussion.

- What does truth telling mean for each of you? About 10 minutes of discussion.
- How can collectives hold space for each other and the poetry community? About 7 minutes of discussion.
- What are we learning and what are the challenges with having a collective? About 5 minutes of discussion.
- What does it mean to us to hold space for women in an allwomen's collective? Why do we emphasize that? About 7 minutes of discussion.

To close, each poet will read an original poem.

"Chameleon or I Am Afraid" read by Gonzalez
