#### Event Description:

Plural like our ancestries, genders, desires are our remappings of the re-territorialized borders between our lands, bodies, and waters. Resisting Euroheteropatriarchal constructions of the cosmos that perversely pastorally prefigure white/straight/cis-male-ness as exclusively normative in nature, womanist/LGBTQ writers, performers, and editors of color share geohistorical perspectives on where and when we re-enter, subverting dialogues around ecology, and decolonizing environmental literatures.

#### Statement of Value:

Furthering conversations in intersectional, womanist, LGBTQ, and pan-people of color place-based creative production, this panel welcomes editors, writers, and educators surfacing stories grounded in diverse eco-realities. This gathering of artists, educators, and editors complicates and elucidates, unweaves and reweaves the enlacings of rural/urban ecology, terrestrial testimony, the nations within our narration—showing how queer/trans ecopoetics of color are deeply rooted, crafted, necessary.

Each panelist will be utilizing the technology, whether in person or via Zoom.

She is co-editor of *Essential Voices: A COVID-19 Anthology*. A CantoMundo, Macondo, VCCA, and VONA fellow, she teaches at West Virginia University.

**D. Keali'i MacKenzie** is a queer Kanaka Maoli writer and Pacific Tongues Poet-Facilitator. He is the author of From Hunger to Prayer and co-editor of *Bamboo Ridge*'s speculative issue.
